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## INTRODUCTION

Your goal: Learn to type. You'll get there. We're going to help.

Just follow lessons in these workbooks and watch the videos (grades 3-8 only) if your teacher provides them. How much time will that take? Here's an estimate:

*K-2 15-30 min. a week*

*3-8 30-60 min. a week*

Are you surprised you can learn to keyboard in such a short amount of time? Wait till you see how much fun it is! We give you lots of choices. You can even work with a friend, both of you on laptops, Chromebooks, or desktops (no iPads unless you have an attached keyboard).

Follow the plan. Execute it faithfully. It works.

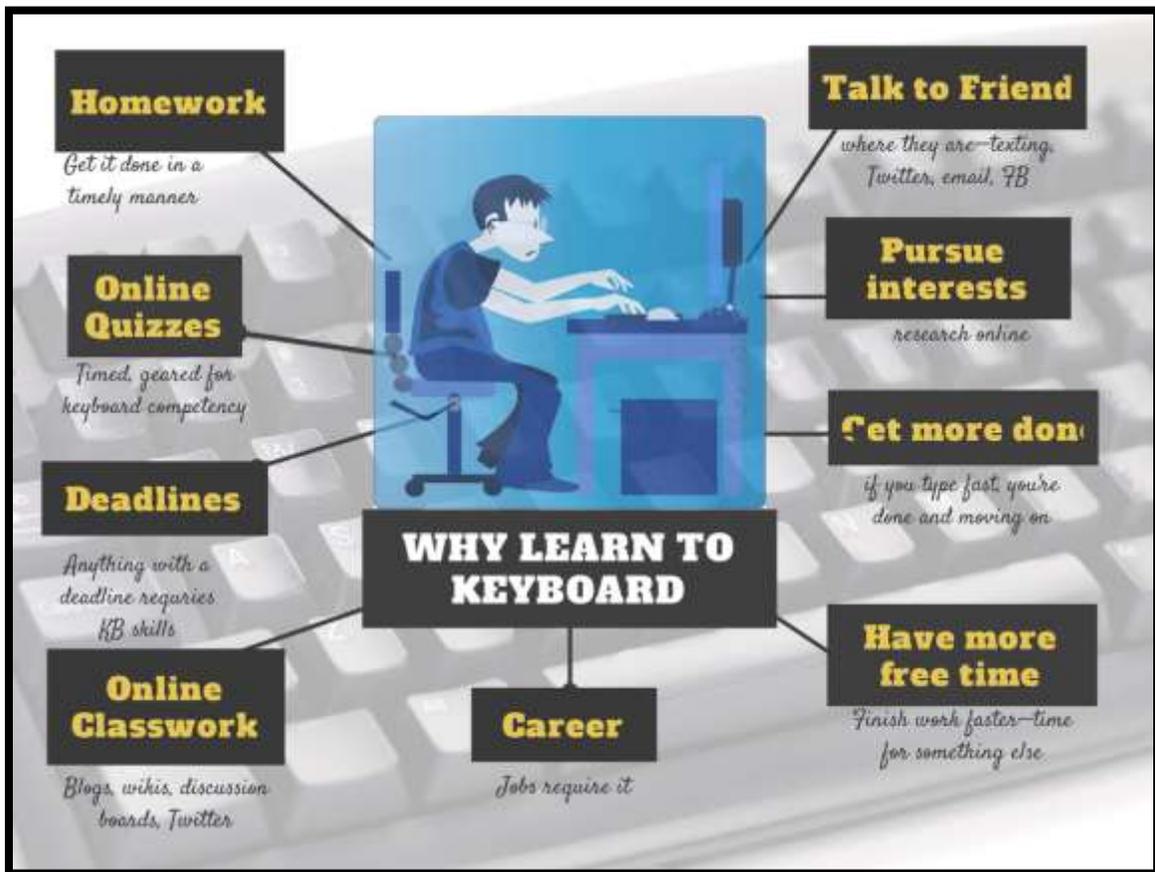
## WHY LEARN KEYBOARDING?

If you've ever seen a friend struggle to type a web address or a book report when they don't know where the keys are, you know why you want to learn.

There are more reasons (see Figure 1):

- *to get homework done in a timely manner*
- *to take online quizzes and tests (becoming more common every day)*
- *to complete online classwork—blogs, wikis, websites, discussion boards*
- *to finish timed work before the clock runs out*
- *to find out more about what interests you (research online)*
- *to get more done in the 24 hours in each day*
- *to have more free time to do other stuff*

To achieve these goals means you type fast enough to keep up with your thoughts. Follow the lessons in this series and it'll happen. As early as 4<sup>th</sup> grade.

## HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

- This workbook is part of the K-8 Keyboard curriculum selected by your school to guide you through Middle School. Each lesson takes 15 to 30 minutes, with an equal amount of home practice (3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade). Your teacher will help you decide how long.
- Go month-by-month, in the order presented.
- **Green highlighted words** are vocabulary you want to learn and use.
- Because each monthly and weekly group of activities likely will take place over multiple time periods, lessons include an underscore (\_\_\_\_) in front of

parts. Check off (in the manner allowed by your digital reader) what you complete and proceed from there next time you practice.

- When using online sites, follow digital citizenship rules discussed in class.
- As you finish each activity and/or skill, check it off on ***Ready to Move On*** (at the end of the month's activities) and the grade-level checklist. Don't go to a new month until everything is completed. Then, print the ***Ready to Move On*** list and hang it by your computer to remember what you know.
- Work at your own pace. Don't feel pressured to keep up or forced to slow down. If you can check it off the list, move on. If you finish the year early, ask your teacher what she'd like you to do.
- BTW—when we reference 'ask your teacher', find the person who started you on this self-directed keyboarding program. That's who we mean.
- Grades 3-8 offer 12 videos, one hour each, to support keyboard study if your teacher uses them. S/he will provide links and explain their use.

## OVERVIEW OF THE KEYBOARDING JOURNEY

Here's an overview of K-8 keyboarding:

- K-1 Introduce mouse skills, keyboarding, key placement, posture*
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Work on keyboarding, key placement, posture, two-hand position*
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Reinforce basics. Work on accuracy and technique*
- 4-5 Continue accuracy, technique. Begin work on speed*
- 6-8 Work on technique, speed, accuracy*

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Lessons include lots of variety so you don't get bored. Here's a rundown of activities from kindergarten through eighth grade:

- *blank keyboard quizzes (grades 3-8)*
- *chart students who meet/exceed grade expectations (grades 3-8)*
- *chart students who type faster than they handwrite (grades 3-8)*
- *chart student progress through year*
- *finger exercises—keyboarding uses eight fingers and a thumb*
- *homework (grades 3-8)*
- *key placement using programs like [Big Brown Bear Typing](#) (K-1)*
- *keyboard covers (grades 3-8)*
- *keyboarding software*
- *keyboarding websites*
- *pre-keyboarding skills like posture, hand position, mouse skills (K-1)*
- *shortkeys to help keyboarding keep up with your thoughts*
- *speed/accuracy quizzes (grades 3-8)*
- *touch typing (start in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade)*

### Overview of K-8 Keyboarding

K-1	<i>Introduce mouse skills. key placement. posture</i>
2 <sup>nd</sup>	<i>Work on. key placement. posture. two-hand position</i>
3 <sup>rd</sup>	<i>Reinforce basics. Work on accuracy and technique</i>
4-5	<i>Reinforce basics: continue accuracy. technique. Begin speed</i>
6-8	<i>Perfect technique. speed.</i>

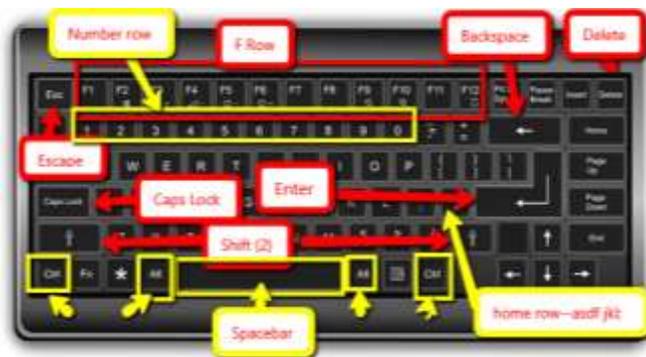

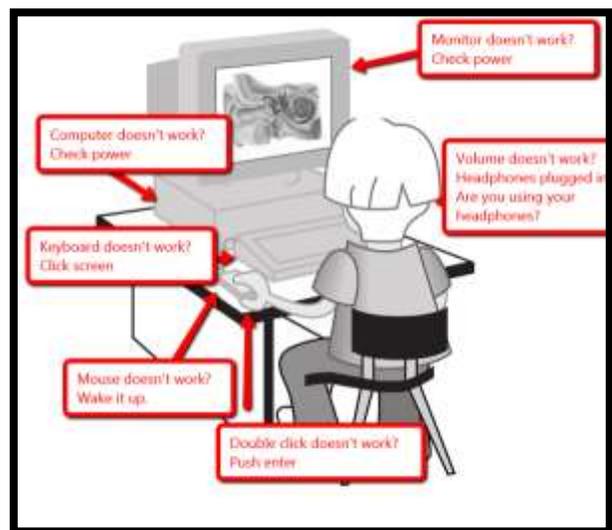

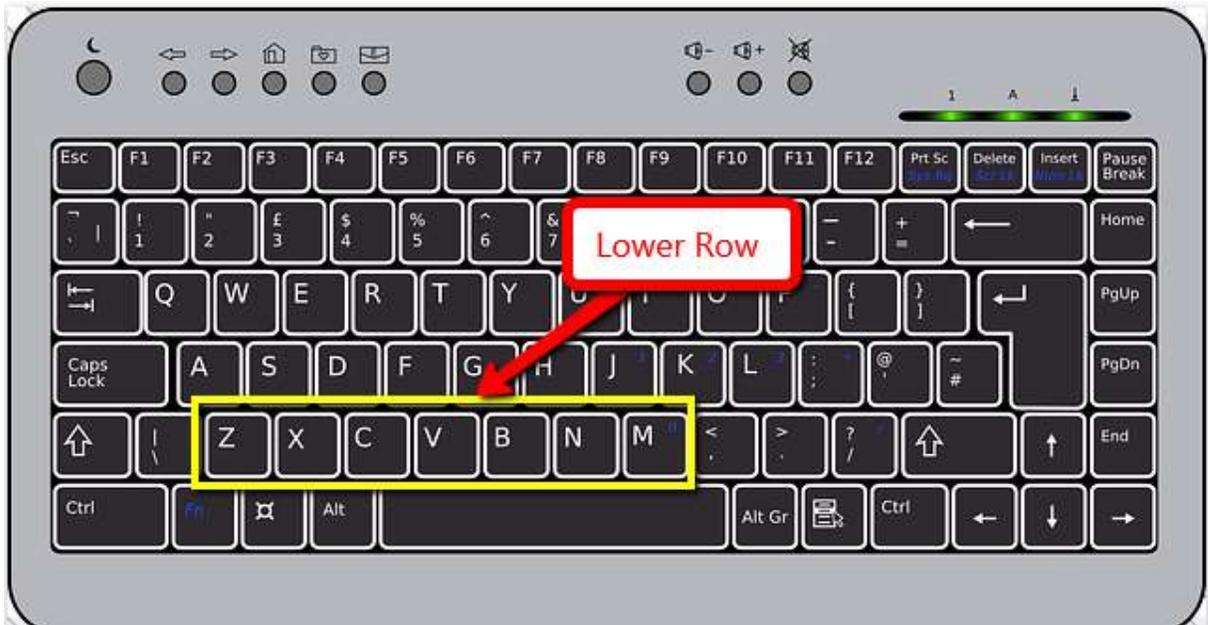


## WHAT TO DO—STEP-BY-STEP

All set? Now follow these activities. Don't move on until you finish each.

\_\_\_ With classmates, go over Lower row keys—*zxcvbnm* (see Figure 32):

Figure 2—Lower row



\_\_\_ Say them five times and use hand motions to show where they are on the keyboard.

\_\_\_ Your teacher will explain that fourth and fifth graders *touch type*—keyboard with hands covered. It feels hard at first and becomes easier.

\_\_\_ By now, you know the three letter rows on the keyboard from memory.

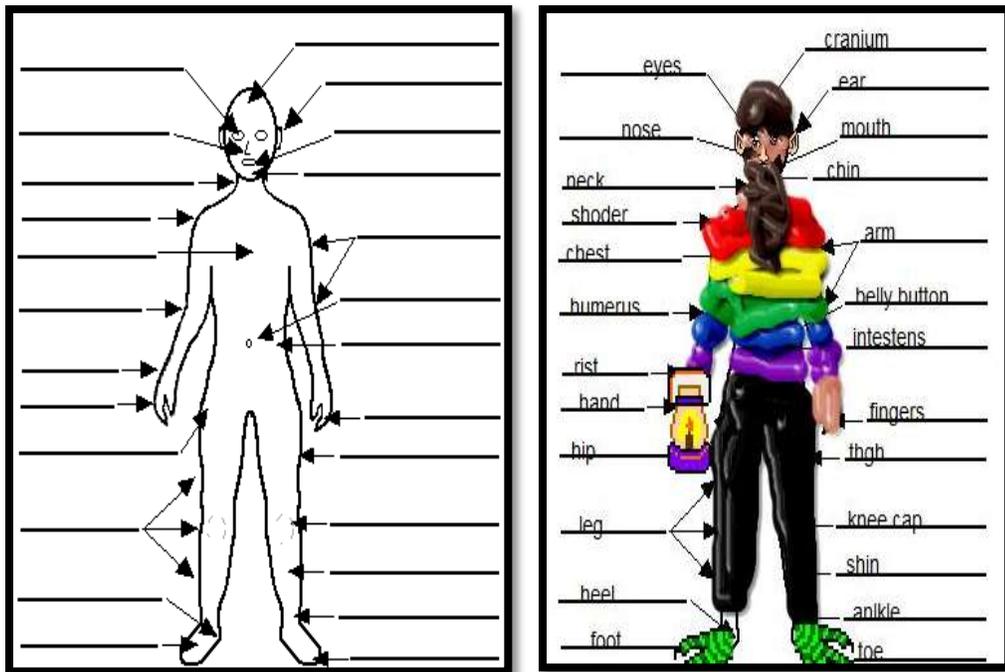
\_\_\_ Practice 10-15 minutes on a program similar to [Type to Learn](#), [Typing Web](#), [TuxTyping](#), or [Typing Club](#). Some are free, some require a fee. Some are used online; some are downloaded software.

\_\_\_ Several times during the month, cover hands with a light cloth so you can't see keys. Test your memory of where they are.

\_\_\_ Twice a month: Do finger exercises.

\_\_\_ Do several projects that use keyboarding to support class inquiry. For example: Complete a fill-in-the-blank template on a topic that connects to a subject your teacher mentions. It will be in a drawing or word processing program you are familiar with. Fill in the blanks, then decorate. Figure 33a shows a human body template before you fill it in. Figure 33b shows it completed:

\_\_\_ Use good keyboarding habits, as you do whenever you type.

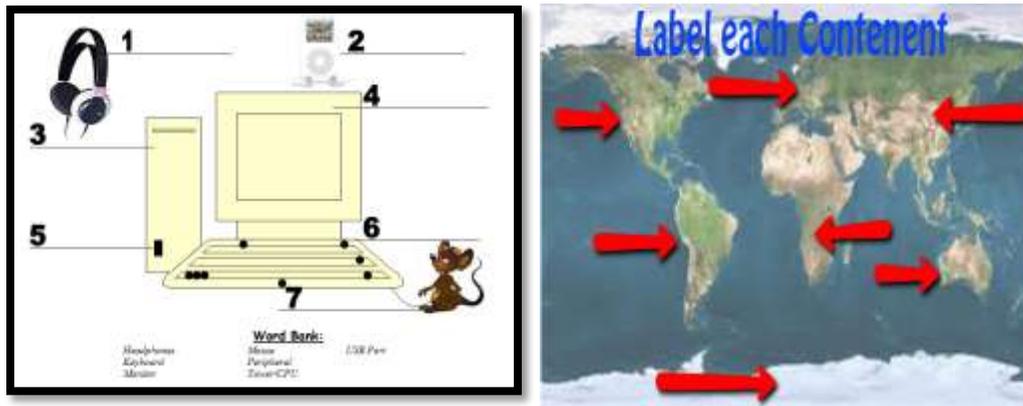
\_\_\_ Some of the challenges of filling out templates:

- *Making font small enough to fit on the line*
- *Changing line length*
- *Getting typing on the line, not under it*
- *Pointing arrows at the right spots (if you're adding arrows)*

\_\_\_ Figure 34a and 34b are two more templates, to be filled out at keyboard:

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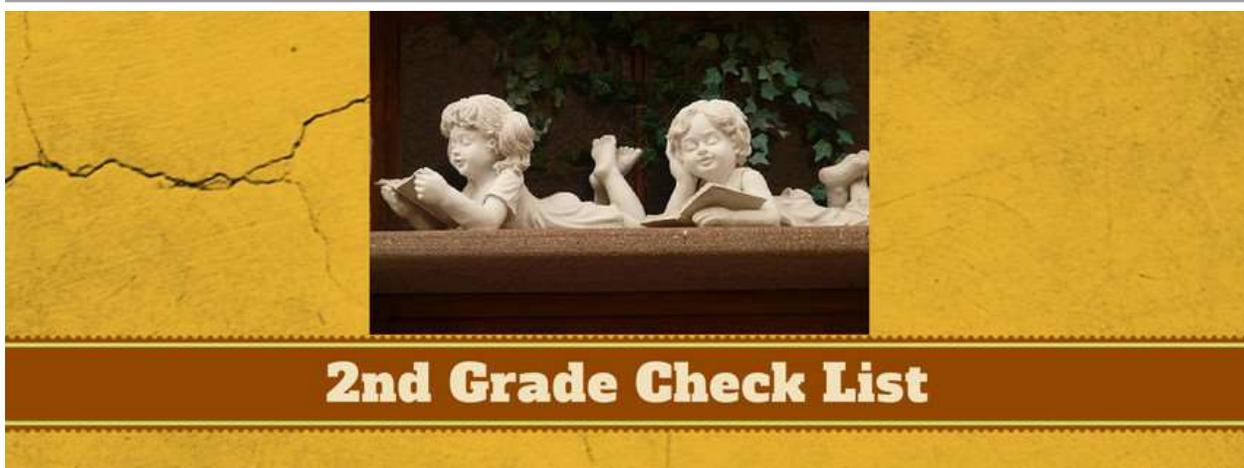
Figure 4a and 34b—Fill-in-the-blank template
